

Group Leader Guide "The Wait Is Over" - Peace On Earth, Good Will Towards Men December 13, 2020

Group Creed

// Message Summary

The Israelite's waited around 400 years for the Messiah to come. Sometimes it feels like we are also waiting for God to show up in our lives. However, as Teaching Pastor Ben Foote explains in week 2 of "Peace On Earth, Good Will Towards Men," we have amazing hope because on a day in history, Jesus was born, bringing with Him peace, joy, and delivered promises!

// Biblical Background: Old Testament Chronology and Order

The Intertestamental Period, as Ben mentioned, was the period between the end of the Old Testament and the beginning of the New Testament. This was a period of roughly 400 years. However, the Old Testament isn't in chronological order. It is organized, more or less, by genre. The last book of history that takes us up to 400 BC is the book of Nehemiah. After Nehemiah are plenty of books that take place or were written well before the time of Nehemiah. Confusing, I know.

The first section of the Old Testament is Pentateuch, or Torah. This consists of the first 5 books of the Bible, which establishes the Law. They are also historical and tell of certain events from the beginning of time to when the Hebrew people enter the Promised Land.

The next section is the historical books, starting in Joshua and ending in Esther (which comes after Nehemiah, but happens before.)

Next are the poetical, or wisdom, books. These go from Job through the Song of Solomon and are almost exclusively made up of poetry.

Then comes the Prophets, split into 2 separate categories: the Major Prophets and the Minor Prophets. That designation has to do with the books' lengths, not their importance. Many of these prophet's stories can be found in the historical books. The Major Prophets are arranged chronologically, and then that resets at the beginning of the Minor prophets. Malachi is the last book of the Bible, and also the last written, during the time of Nehemiah.

The New Testament is similarly confusing. The first 4 books tell different perspectives of the life of Jesus. They are in the order set by Saint Augustine because he thought that was the order that they were written in, though most scholars agree now that Mark was written first.

Then comes the book of Acts, which tells the story of the early Church. It is actually a direct sequel to the book of Luke. Then come the epistles, which are letters written by Apostles. They are arranged by author. Paul's letters come first and are arranged by length, not chronologically. Then come the other apostles' letters. Finally comes Revelation, a book written by another apostle (John), that is in the apocalyptic genre of writing.
